Mission, Vision and History



Our Mission

To promote the growth, development, and independence of people with disabilities through programs of therapy, education, and work opportunity.



Our Vision

An inclusive world is the world as it should be. Northwest Center is living proof that when people of all abilities learn and work together, everyone benefits.



Our History

In 1965, four mothers refused to accept that their children would be barred from school and their communities. They founded Northwest Center, led the fight for the first state law to grant access to public education to people with disabilities, and paved the way for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Together, they made history and changed the world! Today their spirit lives on at Northwest Center as we continue to expand opportunities for people with disabilities from birth through career.



Impact Report for Kids Programs

Northwest Center Kids provides inclusive programs where families receive individualized programs of education, advocacy, therapy, and family support that nurture the development of children with and without disabilities.

Hospital to Home: Program supporting homecomings for hospitalized babies, their families, and clinicians in the critical time when babies transition home from a hospital stay.

Early Supports: A family-centered program for children with developmental delays. We provide education, resources, support and therapy.

Early Learning: Northwest Center Kids at Chinook is an inclusive early learning center where children (6 weeks to 5 years old) with and without disabilities learn and play side-by-side.



Meet Alexa and Royalty

Just a few years ago, Alexa endured unimaginable hardship. Unhoused and unemployed, she faced violence and profound personal losses. On top of that, she had lost custody of her eldest daughter, and her youngest child, Royalty, was having challenges learning to communicate using her voice. Feeling utterly alone, Alexa's world had unraveled, devoid of any support system.

Then, she found Northwest Center. This connection became a transformative lifeline. Royalty began speech therapy, received an Autism diagnosis, and mother and daughter learned to communicate using multiple modes of communication, e.g. body language, gestures, tools, etc.

While in the program, Alexa received vital mental health support and essential supplies, which offered stability to obtain housing. Alexa gained confidence to advocate for herself and her daughter. She finally felt seen and heard. As Royalty approached graduation from Northwest Center's programs, Alexa's team partnered with her to navigate complex transitions, including helping her secure Royalty's IEP (Individualized Education Plan) and a place in Seattle Public Schools.


Today, Royalty is thriving, making friends every day as she expands her ability to communicate and connect with others to share her joy. Alexa's relationship with her older daughter has healed. And Alexa is employed at YMCA, having been promoted multiple times, where she helps others.

Alexa's journey is a powerful demonstration of intuition, strength, and resilience. "For the first two years of Royalty's life, I felt like I was failing my daughter. I felt hopeless." She offers this advice to new parents: "Trust yourself. You know your children better than anyone."

In 2024, Alexa was honored by Washington state Department of Children, Youth & Families with an Unsung Hero (Parent) Award, which recognizes exceptional caregivers.

IMPACT – Inclusion Mentorship Program for Increasing Access in Childcare Team

IMPACT provided live trainings and on-demand courses throughout the year and was honored to participate in local, state, and national conferences. The team spoke at conferences related to early childhood, which allowed them to reach a broader audience for inclusive early learning.



Impact Report for Employment Services

Northwest Center Employment Services helps adults with disabilities achieve their career aspirations. We guide individuals to find and maintain jobs they're passionate about. And we help employers create inclusive workplaces.

Job Development: From assessing career interests and providing handson training to finding meaningful employment for both employees and employers, we support adults with disabilities every step of the way.

Supported Employment: Northwest Center's dedicated employment consultants provide continuous support throughout the entire employment journey, including on-the-job coaching as long as needed.

Transition Services: We empower high school students with disabilities to successfully transition into the workforce by offering career interest assessments, one-on-one navigation support, and targeted training.

He's incredibly proud and happy to be part of the Safeway Team, even earning Employee of the Month within his first year. Joey thrives on building social connections and providing positive customer service to everyone he meets. He's also a client of NWC, where our Employment Services helped him secure this fulfilling role.

Joey was expertly paired with Cody, Northwest Center's Southwest Senior Pod Manager and a 10-year job coach. Cody oversees 65 clients, ensuring they receive professional customer service, and his dedication is deeply personal. Diagnosed with dyslexia while on a baseball scholarship at the University of Washington, Cody realized the frustration of lacking specialized support. This experience fuels his commitment to ensuring no one else feels that same sense of not knowing resources are available.

Cody and Joey form a natural team, sharing a lighthearted rapport and a common goal: Meaningfully contributing to their community. Cody regularly visits Joey at Safeway, checking on his progress and troubleshooting any challenges Joey faces while collecting shopping carts, bagging groceries, and assisting customers.

This job has given Joey independence, purpose, and a strong sense of community. He's learned a great deal and is proud of his work. Joey also credits Cody as a great job coach who helps him navigate challenges and believe in himself. Joey emphasizes, "my story shows how important it is to give people with disabilities the opportunity to work." Cody echoes this, stating that when companies "embrace inclusivity and provide opportunities for people with disabilities, their workplaces become stronger, their teams become more connected, and their communities thrive." Joey is just one of the 704 adults with disabilities the Northwest Center assisted this year.






